How best to care for your wool carpets and rugs

Entrance or walk-off mats

The use of entrance mats at all outside entrances to the house is highly recommended, as it will significantly reduce the rate at which the carpet will soil. They should be of adequate size to allow street dirt to be removed from shoe soles and must be cleaned regularly themselves.

Protective treatments

Many carpets come with a protective fibre treatment to reduce problems with staining and soiling. These treatments, while effective in many ways, are not bullet-proof and will eventually wear off. Quick response to spills and regular cleaning is still required.

Carpets that have no protector applied by the manufacturer can be treated after installation on the floor by a WoolSafe accredited carpet cleaning company. Find your nearest WoolSafe Approved Service Provider at www.woolsafe.org/find-a-carpet-cleaner/.

Maintain your carpet regularly

Regular cleaning will extend the life of your carpet and maintain its appearance.

Vacuum clean regularly and thoroughly, which removes gritty dirt that can damage the fibres. Deal with spillages as soon as possible, preferably the moment they occur (see pages 6 and 7).

When your carpet or rug reaches a stage where it could do with a really good cleaning, you can either do the job yourself, or call a carpet cleaning company.

Cleaning your carpet

If you are considering cleaning the carpet or rug yourself make sure to **use only WoolSafe approved products**. Look for this Mark on the bottle or package; or check the up to date listing on: <http://www.woolsafe.org/woolsafe-approved-carpet-care-products/consumer-products/>.



WoolSafe approved products have been **independently and scientifically tested** and are safe and effective for cleaning and maintaining wool and wool-rich carpets and rugs.

Never use any detergents such as dish washing liquids, soaps or other cleaners recommended for general household use. Although they may clean your carpet satisfactorily they will almost certainly cause problems such as rapid re-soiling, colour bleeding or other damage to the pile or backing of the carpet. Beware of products claiming to be safe on all fibres, including wool. It might be true, but if it does not have the WoolSafe Mark, it is not endorsed by most carpet manufacturers!

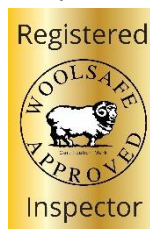

General rules for spot removal

- Soak up liquids with **white** kitchen roll, tissues, toilet roll or **clean** cloth
- Scoop up or scrape off solids
- Try to identify the spots prior to treatment – if unsure, use solvent first
- Always work from the edge of the spot inwards
- **BLOT, do NOT rub**
- Use **small** quantities of spot remover at a time, applied to a cloth, NOT directly to the spot; work into the spot with a small, soft brush or sponge
- Take care with applying solvents to bitumen-backed carpet tiles
- When using solvents always ensure there is plenty of fresh air ventilation
- Always thoroughly rinse out water-based spotters with clean water
- Dry the spot, if possible, with a hair dryer

D.I.Y. Treatments

- 1 Blot with white kitchen roll or paper tissues
- 2 Vacuum clean (when dry)
- 3 Cold water; apply it to a white cloth and blot
- 4 Warm water; apply it to a white cloth and blot
- 5 WoolSafe approved carpet shampoo solution (diluted)
- 6 WoolSafe approved spot remover for water-based stains
- 7 WoolSafe approved spot remover for oily stains / impregnated powder
- 8 Absorbent paper or paper tissue and hot iron (on wool carpets only!)
- 9 Chewing gum remover (solvent or freeze type)
- 10 Acetone
- 11 White spirit or turpentine substitute
- 12 Surgical spirit (ethyl alcohol or ethanol)
- 13 Rub with a coin
- 14 Rub gently with coarse sand paper

- 15** *WoolSafe approved disinfectant or deodorizer*
- 16** *Rust remover*
- 17** *Carpet re-colouring kit*

Other helpful tips relating to carpets and rugs

Fibre loss

Many new carpets, particularly those with a cut or velour pile, lose fibre during the first few weeks on the floor. This “shedding” or “fluffing” is caused by the way the yarn is spun and the carpet is made. It is no reason for alarm, but a natural phenomenon which will stop eventually. Just vacuum the carpet a little more gently for the first few weeks and empty the dust bag or receptacle regularly.

Pile Reversal

Pile reversal, also known as *shading* or – wrongly – *water marking or pooling* (water is *not* the cause), is the effect whereby areas of velour or velvet carpet appear to become lighter or darker in colour than the surrounding area. It is an optical effect, brought about by localised changes in the direction of pile lay and made visible by the way light is reflected off the carpet surface. It is caused by traffic patterns or unevenness in the floor; but is NOT a carpet defect. Loop pile carpets are not affected by this.

Sprouting

Occasionally tufts may appear above the surface of the carpet. Do NOT pull them out; but cut them level with the surrounding tufts with small scissors.

Colour change

The carpet may change colour over time for a variety of reasons, often due to pile flattening or gradual soiling. A good professional cleaning will usually restore the carpet's appearance.

Very light-coloured – beige and cream - wool carpets may brighten in colour in the first few weeks, particularly near windows and patio doors. It will be most obvious if you move a piece of furniture and notice the carpet appears yellower underneath. It's not that the carpet has yellowed, just that the natural creamy colour of the wool has 'photo-bleached'. If you leave the 'yellow' part exposed it will quickly change to the same shade as the surrounding carpet.

Darker, dyed carpets will eventually fade when exposed for a long time to the ultraviolet rays in sunlight. The degree of fading depends on the shade and depth of colour chosen and the intensity of the light.

Indentations

It is advisable to put furniture cups under the legs of chairs, tables and cupboards to reduce indentations. If these have occurred on a wool carpet or rug lightly moisten the area and the indentation will disappear in 12 - 24 hours.

Draught marking

Carpets may show increased soiling around the edges of a room, under doors and near air ducts. This is called draught marking, fogging or filtration soiling, and is caused by the pile fibres filtering out dirt particles from the air blowing under skirting boards or doors, or from ducts. Ensure that these gaps are sealed before the carpet is installed.
